

The Pastor's Column



Lent is for Lovers!

In a twist of fate that only us celibate religious and priests can appreciate, Lent and Valentine's Day fall on the same date this year, Wednesday February 14th. As some of us in the rectory say, "Welcome to our world!" Father Paul has a better spin on this. He has been saying: "Bring your sweetie to Church for Ashes..." You are all adults, so I trust you will work out how to negotiate these two events. Suggestion: you could come to our fabulous Mardi Gras Party on February 13th. Paulist Chef Evan Cummings is featuring heart shaped pancakes!

On further reflection, one could make a case that Valentine's Day and Lent both celebrate love. All our relationships married, engaged, dating, friendship, and family find their source in the love God has for us all. Lent is that critical time to deepen our relationship with God and one another through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. So, instead of the usual, why not consider these Lenten activities that might strengthen the love relationships you do have?

- 1. Pray Together: Find a time to pray with your partner. Beginners: hold hands and say the Our Father together slowly and meaningfully. Advanced: hold hands and read the Sunday scriptures together. Share how you connect with the readings as a couple.
- 2. Active Listening: Couples often complain that they are not heard. Perhaps allow each other to speak for a set period (10 minutes at least) without interruption to talk about what's working well in the relationship and what the challenges are.
- 3. Resolve a conflict: No doubt something will come up during active listening. Work on a challenge in your relationship. Seek to understand the problem. Be gracious and forgiving. Negotiate a solution that is a winwin for both. Can't get there? find a good friend or professional to referee! Don't let conflicts fester... little things become big things if left unattended.
- 4. Sacrifice for the other: In any relationship, partners do things the other won't or can't. Laundry? Cooking? Cleaning? Walking the Dog? Consider going out of your way to take care of an onerous task your partner always does.
- 5. Care for others: Do an act of service together. There are plenty of opportunities to donate your time just for a day or for long term. Working together as a team to better the community will better your relationship!

Single and hating it? I have three Lenten actions for you to consider. The first is to pray for an abundance of God's love in your heart. God's love is infinite. Ask God to expand your heart to overcome past hurts so to be open to new relationships. Second, my Mom lived by the adage: "You have to be a friend, to make a friend." Don't wait for someone else to reach out to you. Take the first step yourself, trusting that whatever happens, God is with you. (Just try not to be creepy about it.) Finally, sacrifice for others. The best antidote for loneliness is to reach out to others through service. I always hear from volunteers that they get more out of service than they give. It also puts you in a situation to meet others of like hearts.

These ideas are just a start to get you thinking creatively about Lent. We have a ton of great things planned for this prayerful season. (See Below!) Come with your sweetie or come alone... either way when you are with the Body of Christ, you will be surrounded with the Love of God and good things will happen. That's God's promise to us.

Our season begins with Ash Wednesday and ends inside of the walls of Jerusalem at the precipice of the Triduum. Over the next few weeks, we will have many events, talks, and moments of prayer that will help you journey, encounter, and reflect:

Journey




Our parish mini-retreat, *Oasis*, will take place on Saturday, February 24th from 9:00 AM - 12:30 PM. Our first parish retreat in several years, *Oasis* brings our community together to journey through the most important aspects of the Lenten season. Bring the lessons and prayers from our presentations and group discussions with you on your forty-day trip through the desert of our souls.

Walk in the footsteps of Christ during the Stations of the Cross, held every Friday after 12:10 PM mass, at 6:30 PM, and at 7:30 PM (en Español).

To better journey with every facet of our parish community, our 6:30 PM Stations of the Cross will be led each week by a different St. Paul's ministry. They will offer a unique set of reflections relating to their mission during the devotion. These 6:30 PM Stations will be live-streamed to allow everyone access to participate, or use the playbacks as part of a weekly devotion.



Every Wednesday night in Lent, we will hold an additional mass at 6:30 PM. There is no better way to keep the spirit of Lent in your heart! Come by after

work for a mid-week celebration of holiness and sanctity.



Members of Saint Paul's parish are eager to invite you to participate in our start-up efforts to become <u>an official Laudato Si International Parish</u> to follow Pope Francis' 2015 encyclical, *Laudato Si*.

Currently there are over 1,100 Laudato Si parishes worldwide, dedicated to reverencing, respecting and nurturing our planet as God commanded us to do. Pope Francis has passionately addressed the urgent need for environmental stewardship, emphasizing the interconnectedness of all living beings in a call for a collective response to the ecological crisis.

We hope you will join us in participating in educational and action-oriented opportunities starting this Lent. 
Part of the journey of Lent involves living as Jesus did during the forty days in the desert. Every year, we like to remind parishioners of the designated days of fasting and abstinence. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics aged 18-59. Fasting is defined as taking one full meal during the day, and two smaller meals to maintain physical strength. Those small meals should not equal a full meal in quantity. Abstinence forbids the eating of meat and poultry; we are strongly encouraged to practice abstinence and fasting on all Fridays in Lent.



As we draw closer to Holy Week, full participation in the liturgy will further facilitate our journey to holiness:

- Join the Palm Sunday procession on Saturday, March 23rd or Sunday, March 24th
- Purify your heart for the Triduum on Reconciliation Monday, March 24th, from 2:00 PM - 4:00 PM and 6:00 PM - 9:00 PM
- Remain with Christ in the garden on Holy Thursday, March 28th, after our
 7:00 PM service for guiet meditation and song
- Join us for the Seven Last Words on Good Friday, March 29th, at 1:30 PM.

Encounter




Every Friday in Lent, we will hold Adoration of the Eucharist following our 7:30 AM mass through the beginning of our 12:10 PM mass, ending with a Rite of Benediction. Adoration cuts to the heart of our faith, offering a profound encounter with Christ while keeping our eyes towards God in wonder, humility, and gratitude.



The Living Stations of the Cross, held on Friday, March 22nd at 6:30 PM, presents real people - St. Paul's parishioners - in tableaux expressing the essential action and emotions of Jesus and those around Him as He made His way to the cross. This experience is moving for performers and spectators alike.

If you would like to participate, rehearsals begin Saturday, February 10 and continue every Saturday through March 16 from 10AM to Noon, plus a weeknight rehearsal before the presentation. - The celebration of the Easter Vigil on Saturday, March 30th at 7:30PM, where, God willing, a cohort of more than a dozen catechumens will be baptized and confirmed into the faith.


- Paola Piscitelli and Lorenzo Sironi from Sant'Egidio, who will speak to us about New York City Homelessness and our encounters with those in need.

It is rare for churches to sing the full Passion of the Christ during Holy Week, let alone debut new musical settings of the sacred scripture. St. Paul's is blessed to premier the work of our composer-in-residence J. Oconer Navarro for the third year in a row; this year, you will hear the Passion According to St. Mark on Palm Sunday.

Reflecting on this great gift, "Hearing the Passion at St. Paul's: A Behind the Scenes Look" will explore the composition of this year's Passion setting and the impact of liturgical music on our prayer. This video presentation, screened the Wednesday prior to Holy Week, dissects Mr. Navarro's process of writing new liturgical music to frame and accompany the Gospel narratives of Christ's sacrifice.



Almsgiving has always been a key component of Lenten penance, offering us a chance to reflect on our gratitude for what we have and the ways we may be able to bless others in need.

Through the Desert God Leads us to Freedom | Pope Francis








THIS SUNDAY: Welcome Weekend

Lenten Reflections Small Group Sunday, February 18 - 3:30 PM-5:00 PM @ Parish Center




About the book:
