## The (Associate) Pastor's Column

When is a haircut more than just a haircut? Certainly time is a factor here as by the time this is published, I will likely have had my first haircut in four years. I

know that my ponytail and long hair have been much loved by many, though not universally and I respect that. However, just as Ecclesiastes says "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens" (Eccles. 3:!), it is time for Fr. Evan to get a haircut.

So why the long hair in the first place? Those who knew me when I was helping at St. Paul's as a seminarian or when I was first ordained I had a pretty normal length haircut. So what happened between 2019 and now? Well, the answer to that question is not much of a surprise as it's something that has affected all of our lives in a myriad of ways: Covid.

Just like the rest of the world in March of 2020, I was not going out and living life as normal, and this of course included haircuts. We saw stories of many learning to cut their own hair or the hair of those they lived with, but no one in the Paulist house in Columbus was feeling up to that task. As we emerged from total isolation and could return to such things as haircuts, I was pretty shaggy. However, God invited me to something unexpected as a form of prayer in light of the pandemic. God invited me to not cut my hair as a sacrifice and intentional prayer for the end of the pandemic.

In short, God was inviting me to do something seemingly foolish for him, to be a fool for Christ. I have long appreciated the fools of Christ, saints who do seemingly outlandish things to proclaim the Gospel. One can easily consider John the Baptist not cutting his hair as part of that tradition. My favorite example is Simeon the Stylite who lived atop a pillar in Aleppo and preached to passersby. While I don't consider my lack of a haircut as bold, it was still somewhat unconventional and certainly a sacrifice, as anyone with long hair can attest to the difficulty of managing said hair.

And thus, I let my hair continue to grow without touching a razor to any of it. However, As the world rolls on and successful vaccination efforts have been rolled out to ensure equity and healthcare access around the world, Covid is much less of a threat. In 2023, Dr. Tedros Ghebreyesus, the Director-General of the World Health Organization, declared that Covid is over as a global health emergency (though he cautioned that it is still a global threat). The CDC has shortened quarantine to 24 hours of being fever-free. While Covid is here to stay with us, we have by and large moved into a new stage of life, and as such, my prayer tied up with my hair is moved into a new stage as well. So, for now, it is time to say goodbye to my lengthy locks and return to a shorter hairstyle (don't worry, the hair will be appropriately donated).


This talk was the first in our conversation series, *Finding Faith in Unforeseen Places*. We look forward to hosting more great speakers in the near future.





This Easter, God willing, a dozen catechumens will be baptized into the Church, and more than a dozen Catholic candidates will be brought into full communion with the faith. It is truly a blessing to be a part of their formation and witness the many ways God calls each of us to a deeper understanding of His Love.

Last Sunday at 10AM, the Elect participated in the first of three Scrutiny Rites which take place in the 3rd, 4th, and 5th Sundays of Lent.



At the base of the Annunciation altar in the south aisle of the church, there is a book that includes the names of this year's class of catechumens and candidates. We ask that you keep them in your prayers as they journey through Lent towards the sacraments. The next time you're in the church, consider stopping by the altar and offering the following prayer:

Good and gracious God, you call all of us to seek you, know you, and love you. Bless and protect our catechumens as they await their baptism. Guard them from all evil, purify and heal them by your grace, and deliver them into the company of your faithful.

Guide our candidates to the fullness of faith, strengthen them in their vocation, and activate the grace of their baptism as they journey to full communion.

We pray also for all who seek you with a sincere heart. By your Holy Spirit, lead them by their conscience to all that is good, beautiful, and true.

Pour out your Holy Spirit upon us all during this Lenten season, so that by the spirit's inspiration, we may know, follow, and love Jesus more closely, accept our crosses, and participate in the Paschal mystery.


## **Weekly Devotions**

### A Meditation from your Laudato Si team

Review each day in your evening prayer this Laudate Deum quotes from Pope Francis: "For 'we are part of nature, included in it and thus in constant interaction with it,' and thus 'we [do] not look at the world from without but from within" (LD 25)

From first waking in the morning until now, God, help me review my day from my place within creation. Pay attention to what moments rise to the top of your memory as you reflect upon these questions.

- How did my actions reflect a sacred, affectionate, and humble respect to our "universal family" of all of God's creation? How did they not? (LD 67)
- Did my actions build up or break down a "healthy and harmonious relationship" with creation and all God's creatures? (LD 27)
- How did I interact with "institutions [such as banks, schools, companies; who] preserve the rights of the more powerful without caring for [the rights] of all"? (LD 43)

Part of the journey of Lent involves living as Jesus did during the forty days in the desert. Every year, we like to remind parishioners of the designated days of fasting and abstinence.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics aged 18-59. Fasting is defined as taking one full meal during the day, and two smaller meals to maintain physical strength. Those small meals should not equal a full meal in quantity. Abstinence forbids the eating of meat and poultry; this is compulsory on Fridays in Lent.
